



The Winners

POETRY:

The Ambika Ananth Award for Poetry goes to Ramesh Karthik Nayak for "Chakmak" (Red River, 2023) for 'the large pictures that emerge from the lines so beautifully, thoughtfully and poetically crafted by the creative thinker, life-artist and poet, rolled into one.'

The Runner-up in Poetry is **Sritama Sen** for her debut poetry collection, "*There Used to be a Lake Here Once*" (Writers Workshop, 2024), 'at once exceptional, impactful and rich in poetry'.

FICTION:

The GSP Rao Award for Fiction is given to Monica Singh for "Pronounced Guilty" (Readomania, 2024) for 'its ability to be both a compelling work of fiction and a stark social commentary on the Indian judicial system.'

The Runner-up in this category is **Raghav Rao** for his debut novel, "*Missy*" (Penguin Random House, 2024), 'a gripping tale of a wronged maid who escapes to America and builds a successful life there, till, forty years later, her past catches up with her.'

NON-FICTION:

The GSP Rao Award for Non-Fiction goes to Manu S Pillai for "Gods, Guns and Missionaries: The Making of the Modern Hindu Identity" (Penguin Random House, 2024), 'an extensively researched, carefully documented, and engagingly presented analysis of modern Hinduism's identity formation.'

The Runner-up for Non-Fiction is **A M Gautam** for his "*Indian Millenials*" (Aleph, 2024), 'an entertaining study of the much-misunderstood millennials—their aspirations, attitudes, confusions, and contributions.'
